Summary

Bezerédi, Imre: Criminal strategy and police trust building (4-41)

13/2001 of the Constitutional Court. (V. 14.) AB determines public security in the following way: "The nature of public security, its relation to public order, internal order, and the conceptual definition of the latter are the subject of scientific debates. It is not the task of the Constitutional Court to take a position on these. However, an overview of the relevant elements of the legal system from this point of view also shows that public safety is an ambiguous category, behind the term there are several interests and values, as well as several tasks of a fundamentally different nature."

Zsákai, Lénárd: Innovative training proposals and methods for Police personnel following a research and development project (42-67)

The scientific paper is a training program developed and coordinated by commissioned experts of the Hungarian Police who take an active consortium (end-user) role in the research and development project entitled Autonomous Heterogeneous Robot Swarms for Border Surveillance, Roborder, running between 2017 and 2021. is presented with the dedicated objective of contributing to the implementation of new, innovative technologies and methods applicable in the field of police training.

In the project, the Police prepared an extremely comprehensive training course covering several modules and chapters, the main purpose of which was to pass on the theoretical and practical knowledge of the proper handling of the system to the delegates during the demonstration events, which basically test and present the border control devices developed during the project. members of foreign law enforcement agencies. The model shows through an effective combination of all currently available modern tools and opportunities (e-learning, gamification, interactivity, artificial intelligence), classic educational tools and methods (written material, personal presence, etc.), as well as effective practical elements. novelty.

Nagy, Zoltán András: About the Study of the EU Committee on identity theft and related crimes (68-77)

In early 2000, the Directorate-General for Migration and Home Affairs of the European Commission (DG HOME) of the European Union, with the support of several European organizations, universities and businesses, set up an Expert Committee to carry out a comprehensive investigation into the European situation of online identity theft and related crimes and abuses.

Sallai, János: The capital and the capital police are 150 years old (78-84)

Pest and Buda have always played a decisive role in Hungarian history. Their location on both banks of the Danube, at the crossroads of transport routes, only strengthened their position. The capital, which has a patina history of more than a thousand years, received its current name in 1873 after the merger of Pest, Buda, Óbuda and Margitsziget, although it had been called this way even before that.

Németh, József – Sallai, János: The policing tasks of cities before nationalization in 1920 (85-97)

During the period of dualism, until the nationalization of the police force in 1920, the policing of Hungarian cities was diverse. First of all, it is important to know that from 1873 there was already a city where the police was subordinated to the Ministry of the Interior. This was the newly united capital, Budapest. In addition, the State Border Police (1903) and the Fiume Police (1916) were also established during dualism.

Tarján, G. Gábor: In pursuit of socialist legality (98-116)

In 1953, the independent state defense ceased to exist and was merged into the Ministry of the Interior. Police reorganizations followed one another in order to raise the standard of professional work. The police and police work tried to comply with legality, while the interpretation of "legality" itself left something to be desired. Political reliability remained a primary requirement, which also played a role in the failure to fill the board with a sufficient number of properly qualified professionals. Suszter, Tamás: On the safety of festival tourism in Fejér County - interview with dr. Police officer brigadier general Péter Varga (117-126) The author, as a first-year doctoral student at the National Public Service University's Doctoral School of Policing, conducted an interview with dr.
